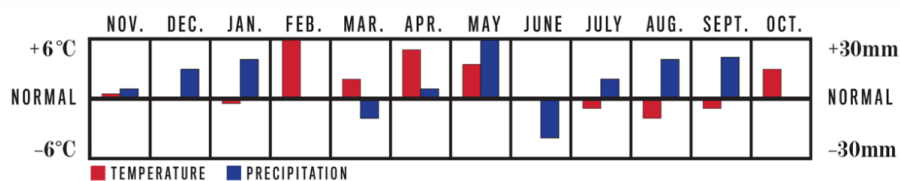

Controlled Burn

2. Register with the Provincial Fire Center at 1-866-404-4911.

If a passing motorist reports a fire that you have not registered with the Municipality and the Provincial Fire Center, you will be fined \$500. If our fire department deems it necessary to call in fire fighters from neighboring municipalities, all costs will be forwarded to the person responsible for starting the fire. Please ensure you have proper Fire Fighting Insurance coverage.

Introduction

The Water Security Agency (WSA) requires that at least once each year waterworks owners provide notification to consumers of the quality of water produced and supplied as well as information on the performance of the waterworks in submitting samples as required by a Permit to Operate a waterworks. The following is a summary of the Town of Aberdeen water quality and sample submission compliance record for the Jan.1st to Dec.31st 2021 time period. This report was completed on March 31, 2022. Readers should refer to the Agency's Municipal Drinking Water Quality Monitoring Guidelines, November 2002, EPB 202 for more information on minimum sample submission requirements and the meaning of type of sample. Permit requirements for a specific waterworks may require more sampling than outlined in the Agency's monitoring guidelines. *A minimum of 0.1 milligrams per litre (mg/L) free chlorine residual is required for water entering the distribution system. Tests are normally performed on a daily basis by the waterworks operator and are to be recorded in operation records. This data includes the number of free chlorine residual tests performed, the overall range of free chlorine residual (highest and lowest recorded values) and the number of tests and percentage of results not meeting the minimum requirement of 0.1 mg/L free chlorine residual. **Water is supplied by the City of Saskatoon and is chloraminated so there is rarely a free chlorine residual. The system operates on total chlorine residual.***

All waterworks serving less than 5000 persons are required to submit water samples for WSA's General Chemical category once every two years if a ground water source and once per three months every second year if a surface water or blended surface/groundwater source. The General Chemical category includes analysis for alkalinity, bicarbonate, calcium, carbonate, chloride, conductivity, hardness (as CaCO₃), magnesium, sodium, sulphate and total dissolved solids.

*Objectives apply to certain characteristics of or substances found in water for human consumptive or hygienic use. The presence of these substances will affect the acceptance of water by consumers and/or interfere with the practice of supplying good quality water. Compliance with drinking water aesthetic objectives is not mandatory as these objectives are in the range where they do not constitute a health hazards. The aesthetic objectives for several parameters (including hardness as CaCO₃, magnesium, sodium and total dissolved solids) consider regional differences in drinking water sources and quality.

Know Your Canadian Bank Notes

ALWAYS LOOK AT TWO OR MORE SECURITY FEATURES WHEN CHECKING BANK NOTES.

Polymer series (2011–13)



- **Feel** the raised ink. **Feel** the smooth, unique texture of the note. It's made from a single piece of polymer.
- **Look** for transparency through the large window and the outline of the frosted maple leaf window.
- **Look** at the details in the metallic portrait and building. **Flip** to see the metallic images on the other side.
- **Look** at the small numbers in the large window that match the note's value. **Look** at the word "Canada" that is transparent and feels slightly raised.

REMEMBER: All five denominations in the *Polymer series* have the same security features.

Canadian Journey series (2004–06)



Hold the note up to the light and **look** through it. The following features are visible from both sides:

- a small, ghost-like image of the portrait appears
- irregular marks form a complete number (like a puzzle)
- dashes (on the back of the note) form a solid line

Feel the raised ink.

Tilt the note: see numbers and maple leaves in the metallic stripe change colour.

REMEMBER: All five denominations in the *Canadian Journey series* have the same security features.

Original Canadian Journey series (2001–02)

The original \$5 and \$10 notes of the *Canadian Journey* series had different security features that did not include a metallic stripe, ghost image, dashes, or a puzzle number.



Feel the raised ink.

Tilt the note: three maple leaves shift from pale to shiny gold.

Slightly **tilt** the note at eye level. The hidden number 5 or 10 appears.

Look at the note under ultraviolet (UV) light. The coat of arms, the words FIVE • CINQ (or DIX • TEN) and BANK OF CANADA – BANQUE DU CANADA glow in blue over the portrait. Tip: Don't rely solely on the UV feature.

Birds of Canada series (1986)



Feel the raised ink.

Tilt the note. The metallic patch changes from gold to green. **Feel** the patch. There are no detectable raised edges and it cannot be peeled off. Note: the \$2, \$5 and \$10 notes of this series do not have a metallic patch.

Look at the small green dots that appear at random on both sides of the note.

A NEW DIRECTION

FOR CANADA'S BANK NOTES

#vertical10



The \$10 bank note, with depictions of Viola Desmond and the Canadian Museum for Human Rights, acknowledges the past and continuing efforts towards achieving rights and social justice for all Canadians. It is the first vertically oriented note issued by the Bank of Canada.

This note has bold security features that are **easy to check and difficult to counterfeit**. Some of these are enhanced compared with the security features on the current polymer notes.

Remember, bank notes are only secure if you check them!

1. POLYMER

Feel the smooth, unique, texture of the note. It is made from a single piece of polymer with some transparent areas.

2. RAISED INK

Feel the raised ink on the front of the note in areas such as the portrait, the word "Canada" and the large number at the bottom.

3. MAPLE LEAVES ABOVE THE PORTRAIT

Look at the three maple leaves above the portrait. The shifting colour of the eagle feather from the back can be seen through the smallest leaf. The largest leaf is a clear window.

4. LARGE TRANSPARENT WINDOW

Look at the detailed metallic images and symbols in and around the large transparent window. **Tilt** the note to see sharp colour changes in the metallic elements. **Flip** the note to see the library ceiling and maple leaves repeated in the same colours and detail on the other side.

5. 3-D MAPLE LEAF

Look at the large maple leaf that appears to be raised. **Feel** it to confirm that the surface is actually flat.

6. TRANSPARENT MAPLE LEAF

Look at the maple leaf on the right side of the large transparent window. It is clear and feels slightly raised on the front of the note.

7. COLOR-SHIFTING EAGLE FEATHER

Look at the pattern in the eagle feather. **Tilt** the note to see the pattern move up and down, and the colour shift from gold to green.

4 3-D Security Ribbon The 2004 style \$100 FRN features a blue ribbon woven into the paper. When you tilt the note back and forth, the bells and "100's" move side to side. If you tilt the note side to side, they move up and down.

5 Serial Numbers The first letter of the serial number on FRNs of series year 1996 or later corresponds to the series year.
 E = 2004 I = 2006 L = 2009A
 G = 2004A J = 2009

Bank Indicators

6 Federal Reserve Indicators The 2004 style FRNs have a letter and number designation, which identifies one of the 12 distributing Federal Reserve Banks. This letter and number designation appears beneath the serial number on the left. The number corresponds to the position of the letter in the alphabet, e.g.: A1, B2, C3, etc. The letter matches the second prefix letter in the serial number.

7 Check Letter/ Quadrant Number

8 Face Plate Number

9 Series Year

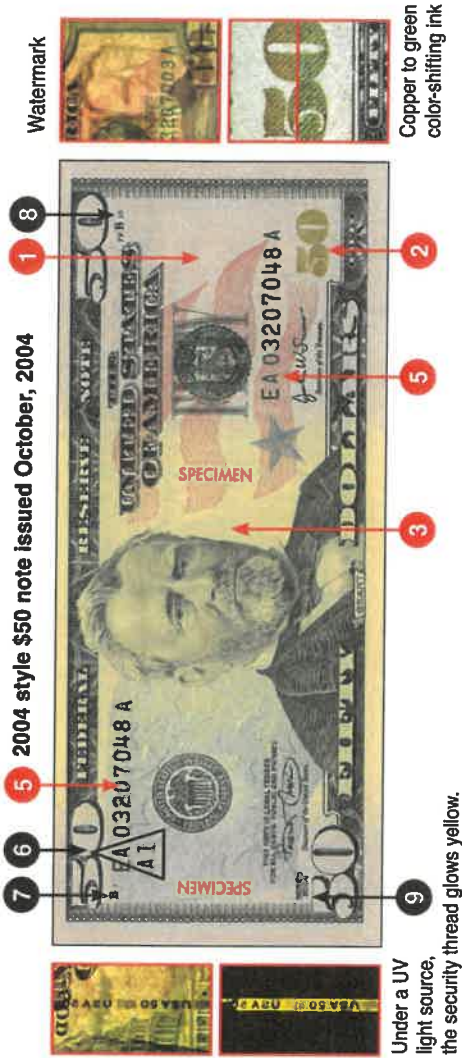
10 Back Plate Number (Not shown) Found on the bottom right-hand corner of the back of the note.

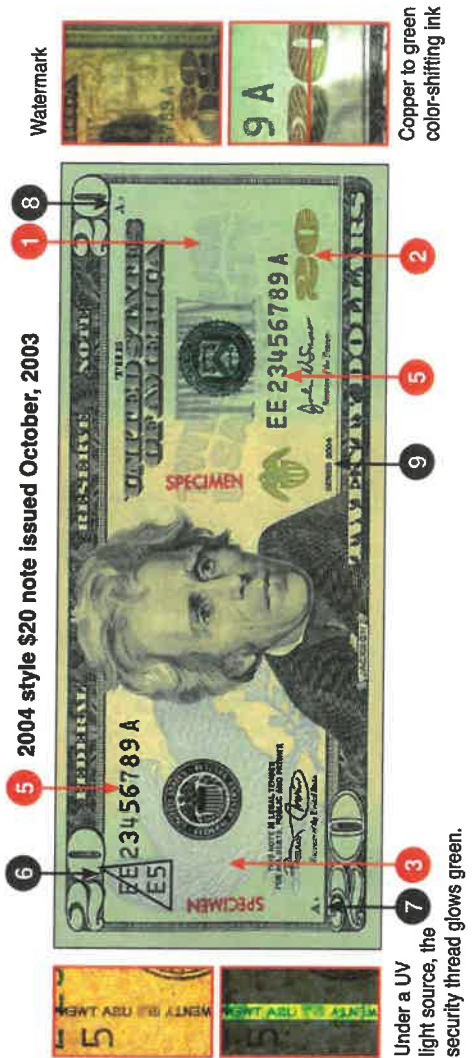
Under a UV light source, the security thread glows light red/pink.

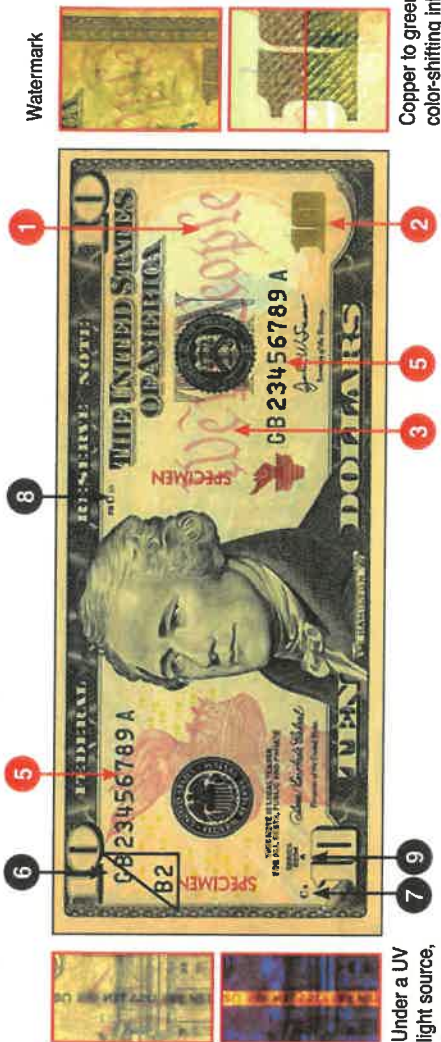

TOP FRAUDS AFFECTING SENIORS

Preface:

RCMP 'E' Division Federal Policing Prevention and Engagement (FPPE) works with both public and private sectors to survey the landscape on crime trends and promote targeted prevention messaging. If you are a victim of fraud or any other crimes, we encourage you to contact your local police. We also encourage you to contact the [Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre](#) if you are a victim of fraud and to visit their website to keep current on the trends.

How Fraudsters Are Reaching Victims:

In Person:

Traditionally fraudsters have operated door-to-door, at parking lots, or at events to sell you stolen or inflated goods, services that don't exist, or invests in fraudulent schemes.

Recommendations: Do not allow fraudsters to pressure you or threaten you; remember the old adage "if it's too good to be true"; do your research before committing to a contract or deciding to invest.

By mail: Another traditional method that could reach more potential victims than the in-person approach. Scammers have used this method in ransom or lottery frauds.

Recommendations: Remember, you cannot win a lottery you did not enter; contact your local police if you receive suspicious and threatening letter.

By SMS Text Messages:

Fraudsters are using technology to reach more potential victims. SMS texts are sent to the cellphones of potential victims using automation. The messages appear to come from legitimate companies, financial institutions and government agencies but direct victims to websites set up by fraudsters for nefarious reasons.

Recommendations: Inspect these messages closely, ignore, delete and mark the message as "Spam" (for Android Phone users). Be aware that the originating number can be falsified to come from legitimate source.

By Emails: Fraudsters are sending emails en-mass to potential victims posing as legitimate companies or financial institutions. Their goals include adding malicious software to steal your information or through further deception have you send funds to them.

Recommendations: Avoid opening unsolicited emails or clicking on suspicious links. Hover over an email address or link and confirm that they are correct. Mark or move suspicious emails to your Junk Folder before deleting it.

By Phone: Fraudsters use technology to automate mass calls to potential victims. The calls contain recorded messages posing as legitimate businesses, financial institutions or government agencies. They may direct you to press a button to speak to a live agent who will attempt to convince you that you are in trouble and ultimately obtain your funds.

Recommendations: Do not follow their instruction and hang up. Be aware that the caller's number can be falsified. Do not provide personal information over the phone to an unknown caller. Police and other government agencies will not call to threaten you or demand payment in crypto assets or gift cards.

TOP FRAUDS AFFECTING SENIORS

#1 Romance Scams:

Fraudsters contact their potential victims through all forms of social networking and dating sites. A relationship is fostered and love is quickly professed, however, love is not what they are after. Fraudsters would use this emotional connection as leverage to ask for financial assistance. Usually claiming some form of emergency. They would continue to extract money from the victim sometimes over a long period even though they have never met in person. They may make excuses as to why they cannot meet in person. Fanciful claims of military service, employment overseas or successful business people are popular.

Recommendations:

Recognize the signs. Beware of individuals who quickly profess their love. Beware of individuals who claim to be wealthy but need to borrow money. Never send intimate photos or video of yourself as they may be used to blackmail you.

#2 Service Scams:

These frauds can involve offers of telecommunications, internet, finance, medical, and energy services. In addition, extended warranties, insurance and sales services may also fall under the category.

Recommendations:

Research all companies and contractors offering services before hiring them. Don't fall for pressure tactics of scarcity, fear, and limited time offer. Talk to someone you trust.

#3 Extortion - SIN Scam:

Fraudsters use automated calling with a recorded message advising you that it is Service Canada and that there is an issue with your Social Insurance Number. The caller's phone number appear to be a local number, it may even appear to come from Service Canada. If you follow their instruction to press a button, a live person will come on the line and speak with you. This person is a fraudster and will threaten you and make up stories to get you to provide your information, transfer funds at their bank account or go a Bitcoin ATM to send them crypto assets. CRA Scam follows a similar MO.

Recommendations:

Hang up. Police and Government agencies will not call you with an automated message to threaten you with legal actions / arrests. Police and Government agencies will also not demand payment in Bitcoin (crypto assets) or gift cards.

#4 Prize Scams:

Fraudsters send out fake lottery and sweepstake letters to potential victims advising them they are winners. To redeem the winning, the victims are instructed to call a number, sometimes a representative from the IRS. The fraudsters would then try to convince the victim to send money to them to cover for taxes and fees on the winnings. A similar scam exists where fraudsters would send emails to the potential victims.

Recommendations:

Do not respond. Remember you cannot win a lottery or sweepstake if you did not enter. Do not provide any personal information. Guard your personal information on the internet.

#5 Bank Investigator Scams:

Fraudsters may try to reach potential victims by phone, by SMS text and by email. The automated phone calls would have recorded messages directing victims to press a button to speak to a representative. A fraudster will come on the phone posing as a bank employee who will ask for your information and convince you that there is a problem with your bank account. They may even “transfer” you to a police officer who will tell you that your account is associated to criminal activities and that they need your help to catch the criminals. These elaborate scenarios are designed to let fraudsters have access your accounts and take your money.

Recommendations:

Don't respond. Hang up. Financial institutions and law enforcement will never ask the public for this type of assistance. Never let anyone remotely access to your computer. Make sure you properly hang up your landline phone. Remember, phone numbers can be falsified.

#6 Emergency Scam:

Fraudsters will contact potential victims by phone, by email or even through social media platforms posing as families or friends asking for financial assistance due to an emergency. A version of this scam is hitting seniors and is called the “Grandparent” Scam. Fraudsters would pose as a grandchild and claim that they are in trouble. Perhaps an emergency that would require the grandparent to send funds to help them out such as an arrest from impaired driving or an emergency visit to a hospital.

Recommendations:

Don't give out your information. Don't let the fraudsters rush you. Confirm with another friend or family member. Guard your personal information on the internet (social media).

WHAT TO DO:

- Stay informed on fraud trends.
- If you are a victim of fraud, report the incident to your local police and the CAFC.
- If you are not a victim, you can still report to CAFC. This helps law enforcement and the public of emerging trends.
- Check the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC) to learn more.

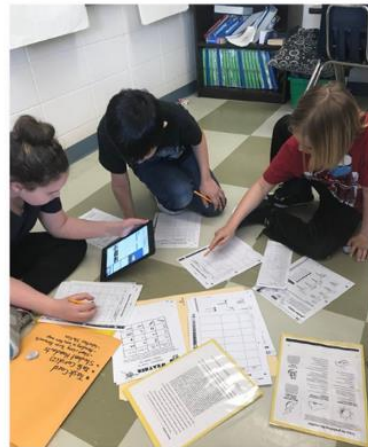

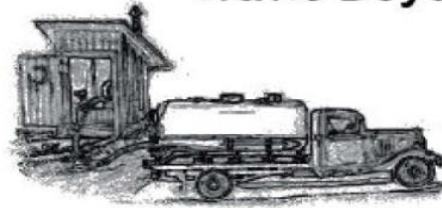

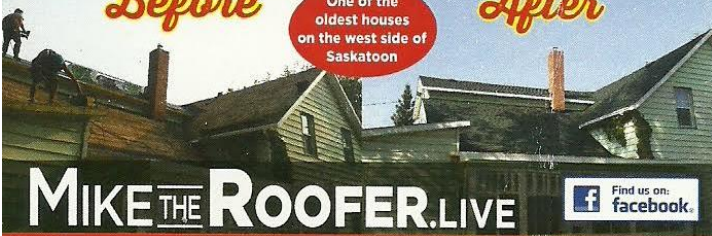
